The app POTSCare was built to assist patients in their journey to finding a lifestyle where living is effortless and symptom-free. The app helps the user track their condition throughout the day, provides them with resources to learn more about POTS, and even analyzes user data to inform patients about what habits reduce symptoms.

The Center for Disease Control and the Ohio Department of Health defines a cancer cluster as "a greater than expected number of cancer cases that occurs within a group of people in a geographic area over a defined period of time." Cancer is the second most common cause of death in Ohio and the United States, accounting for nearly one of every four deaths. According to the Ohio Annual Cancer Report in 2022, Cancer claimed the lives of more than 25,000 Ohioans in 2019, at a rate (162.8 per 100,000 population) that was 12% higher than the U.S. rate (146.0 per 100,000). Why are cancer cases are so high in Ohio? Are there areas that appear to be more prone to cancer than others? What might lead to this? These are some of the questions addressed in this research project. This research is the beginning of what is planned to be a four year look at cancer clusters in Ohio. During this research, Ohio geographic areas, quality of life, important landmarks, and health care available are examined throughout Ohio to help determine possible trends in cancer outbreaks.

The resulting manual has already been successfully used to provide evidence in court hearings that would otherwise have been absent.
