

DEFIANCE COLLEGE - CRIME STATISTICS REPORT

October 2010 (Data for 2007-2010)

In accordance with federal law, Defiance College compiles and reports certain crimes and arrest statistics on an annual basis. The information included below reflects incidents which have been reported to Student Life or local law enforcement in the prior three calendar years. Calendar year data is compiled and reported in the Fall of the year following a specific calendar year (for example, 2010 crime statistics data is reported in the Fall semester of 2011). This data is available to all students and personnel at the College. This data is also made available to prospective students and prospective employees upon request.

This information is provided in three categories: 1) criminal offenses; 2) hate crimes; and 3) arrests and disciplinary actions. Specific definitions of the crime categories identified below are provided in a list at the end of this Crime Statistics Report.

Hate Crimes (or Crimes of Prejudice) are defined as any crime described in the above list or any crime involving bodily Injury in which the victim is intentionally selected because of actual or perceived race, gender, religion, sexual orientation, ethnicity or disability.

ARRESTS & DISCIPLINARY ACTIONS

DEFINITIONS OF CRIME CATEGORIES

Defiance College's crime statistics reporting uses definitions of crime determined through the FBI's Uniform Crime Reporting Handbook (UCR). The summary definitions are included below:

1. Murder (and Non-negligent Manslaughter): The willful killing of one human being by another.
2. Manslaughter by Negligence: The killing of another person through gross negligence.
3. Sexual Offenses (forcible): A sexual act directed against another person, forcibly or against that persons will, or not forcibly or against the persons will where a victim is incapable of giving consent. This definition includes forcible rape, forcible sodomy, sexual assault with an object, and forcible fondling.
4. Sexual Offense (non forcible): unlawful, non-forcible sexual intercourse between persons who are related to each other within the degrees wherein marriage is prohibited by law (incest), and non-forcible sexual intercourse with a person who is under the statutory age of consent (statutory rape).
5. Robbery: Taking or attempting to take anything of value from the care, custody or control of a person by force or threat of force or violence and/or putting the victim in fear.
6. Aggravated Assault: An unlawful attack by one person upon another for the purpose of inflicting severe or aggravated bodily injury. This type of assault is usually accompanied by the use of a weapon or by the means likely to produce death or great bodily harm.
7. Burglary: The unlawful entry of a structure to commit a felony or theft. For reporting purposes this definition includes unlawful entry with the intent to commit larceny or felony; breaking and entering with the intent to commit a larceny; housebreaking; safecracking; and all attempts of these offenses.
8. Motor Vehicle Theft: The theft or attempted theft of a motor vehicle.
9. Arson: Any willful or malicious burning or attempt to burn, with or without intent to defraud, a dwelling house, public building, motor vehicle or aircraft, or personal property of another, etc.
10. Hate Crimes or Crimes of Prejudice: Any crime described above or any crime involving bodily Injury in which the victim is intentionally selected because of actual or perceived race, gender, religion, sexual orientation, ethnicity or disability.
11. Illegal Weapons Violations: Violation of laws or ordinances dealing with weapons offenses, regulatory in nature, such as: manufacturing, sale, or possession of deadly weapons; concealed or openly; furnishing deadly weapons to minors; and all attempts to commit any of the aforementioned.
12. Drug Abuse Violation: Violation of state and local laws relating to the unlawful possession, sale, use, growing, manufacturing, and making of Narcotic drugs.
13. Liquor Law Violation: Violation of laws or ordinances prohibiting; the manufacture, sale, transporting, furnishing, possession of intoxicating liquor; maintaining unlawful drinking places; bootlegging; operating a still. Furnishing liquor to a minor or intemperate person; using a vehicle for illegal transportation of liquor; drinking on a train or public conveyance; and all attempts to commit any of the aforementioned.
