From an Ohio farm to Scotts Lawn and Garden Bonnie Hohlbein '82 is really going global

Bonnie Hohlbein '82 looks very much at home in the Marysville, Ohio, corporate headquarters of the Scotts Company, with its natural wood and deep windows looking out on lush grounds. She calls it a good fit for someone who grew up on an Ohio farm.

Bonnie is a native of Delphos, Ohio, who came to Defiance College after receiving her associate's degree in accounting from Lima Technical College. Arriving on campus as a junior and a commuter student, it wasn't easy for Bonnie to make the connection with the college, but she was always grateful for the scholarship that enabled her to attend. She also enjoyed the liberal arts aspect of her DC education.

"I had taken all my accounting courses, so I got to take some really fun courses," she explained, especially music appreciation and art, which she feels truly enriched her life. She related how after taking art, she could see shadows where she never realized them before. "It actually taught me to see differently."

A couple years after graduating from DC with a B.A. in accounting, Hohlbein attended Ohio State full-time to get her MBA, which she called a great experience.

She went into banking briefly after grad school, but found it too uptight, and then was in public accounting for five and a half years before joining Scotts.

Scotts is the world's leading supplier and marketer of consumer products for do-ityourself lawn and garden care, with products for professional horticulture as well. Bonnie has been with the company for 13 years now. Over that time, she has seen it grow from \$600 million in sales to a hefty \$3 billion, a significant share of the \$7 billion market worldwide. Among the international family of brands owned by Scotts are Miracle Gro,

Ortho, RoundUp, Turf Builder and Smith & Hawken.

This year, Bonnie was named vice president of global technology and operations finance, a position where she handles supply chain, research and development, and IT worldwide.

This involves a great deal of travel and experiences that don't come with every job, Bonnie acknowledges. "I spend a lot of time in Europe - UK, France, Germany, Netherlands and Belgium. London is my favorite, and Belgium is beautiful."

In France, Scotts is headquartered in Lyon, the gastronomical capital of the world.

"I never knew quite what I was eating," Bonnie laughed, telling about her visits there. "I got to the point that I don't even ask, I just say, 'Feed me."

On a more serious note, Bonnie talked about what it is like representing Scotts in the U.S. to other countries. "It's eye-opening. As Americans, we take a lot for granted, I've learned a lot from our international people. It makes you realize why people in other countries have issues with the American people. When you see how they use electricity, heat their homes, conserve water, you realize how much we waste," she explained. In addition to enjoying her job, Bonnie likes the overall atmosphere at Scotts. She calls Scotts CEO Jim Hagedorn a progressive thinker who has instituted a proactive approach to health care. There is a total fitness and health care center for employees and their families across the street from the corporate headquarters and Scotts has taken a strong no-smoking stance (if you smoke, you can't work for Scotts). It was Hagadorn's father who founded Miracle Gro.

Bonnie explained that since the company grew by acquisition, it's something of a mishmash, but she thinks there is still a small company feel to it. "We still have family day, holiday parties, a farmer's market in the parking lot every Friday – but it's also a fastpaced environment. It makes it exciting."

When she's home in Columbus, Bonnie is most likely to spend her free time at a sports event. She calls herself a huge fan and has season tickets to OSU football and men's and women's basketball, and The Columbus Blue Jackets. When asked what she likes to do on vacation, Bonnie replied, "I used to travel a lot but now the last thing I want to do is get on a plane and stay in a hotel room!" Despite that, she enjoys skiing in Tahoe and Colorado.

Spending time with her family is also a high priority for Bonnie. Her parents still live in Delphos and she has four brothers, three in Ohio and one in Kentucky. She also
