OTHER FEES AND CHARGES (p. 11 – 12)

Student Fee: A \$120 non-refundable student fee is charged to full-time students each semester of enrollment. This fee is distributed to support student activities, student organizations, yearbook and use of the Smart Fitness Center.

A \$70 non-refundable student fee is charged to part-time undergraduate students each semester of enrollment. This fee is distributed to support services to students, including technology and use of the Smart Fitness Center.

Part-time, Undergraduate Tuition: \$335 per credit hour

Overload: (over 17 credits per semester) \$335 per credit hour

Graduate Tuition: \$365 per credit hour

Health Insurance Fee: Health insurance is required for all full-time students, and optional for students enrolled for six to eleven credit hours. Cost estimates for the 2007 – 2008 academic year are listed below. The fee is waived upon proof of other insurance coverage.

Student teaching fee: \$200 non-refundable

Senior citizens tuition: Per course \$90. Any person who has reached 60 years of age may enroll in an undergraduate course for this reduced fee. Senior citizens may enroll in graduate courses but will be charged the usual graduate tuition rate. Audits of graduate courses are not allowed.

Auditing courses: Any undergraduate student may audit a course. Auditing fee is \$85 per credit hour. When class size is limited, full-fee students have priority. Full-time students may receive one free audit per semester. Private music instruction cannot be audited.

NEW POLICIES

Requirements for Completing a Second Major

A student who wants to complete more than one major must complete a minimum of 18 hours of additional courses, that do not fulfill a minor or any other major the student is completing.

Requirements for Completing a Second Minor

Students who wish to complete two minors must take a minimum of nine hours of courses in the second minor that do not apply to general education, the major(s) or other minors the student is completing for graduation.

PARTICIPATION IN COMMENCEMENT
(p. 26)

The following statement replaces the previous language regarding students who complete degree requirements in summer and wish to participate in commencement exercises the May preceding their completion.

Only students who are within 9 credits, or two courses totaling no more than 12 credits, of degree completion and are registered for those credits during the summer session at Defiance College may be approved as summer graduates.

MAJOR REQUIREMENTS

Arts and Humanities

(p. 36)

The Arts and Humanities interdisciplinary major is for the student who wants intellectual engagement in more than one subject. This degree is focused on high development of critical thinking, communication, and intellectual or artistic awareness. A student works with the Arts and Humanities advisor to choose courses that meet their intellectual and career goals.

The 42-hour major in Arts & Humanities includes the following course requirements.

Two 3-credit hour courses from each of the following disciplines: Art; Communication Arts; English; History; and Religious Studies for a total of 30 credits. These courses may not include internships, field experiences, or independent research courses.

Four of the above ten courses must be at the 300–400 level.

Three additional 300- or 400-level courses from a single Arts and Humanities discipline (Art, Communication Arts, English, History, International and Global Studies, Religious Studies and Christian Education) beyond the 10 courses listed above.

A capstone to be chosen from one of the following: AH498, CA499, EN490, HI498, IS499, or RL499

Athletic Training Education

The following courses have been added to the requirements for the major in Athletic Training Education. The major now requires 62 credits. PE 357 has also been added to the Wellness major, bringing the total credits to 38.

NEW COURSE

PE 357- Muscle Structure and Function (2 credits)

This course focuses on the functional anatomy of muscle origin, insertion, action and innervations. Applying their muscle knowledge, students will determine the exact muscles used during individual weight training exercises. Conditioning programs will be developed for individual sports that include specific weight training, plyometrics and cardiovascular programs. Prerequisite: BI 235/236 or BI 229

PE 334 – Community First Aid and CPR (1)

Meets the requirements for Red Cross certification in community first aid and CPR, including infant, child, and adult CPR. The course concentrates on the immediate, temporary care given to the victim(s) of an accident or sudden illness until professional help is secured. After satisfactorily completing the practical requirements and tests, students will receive community first aid and CPR cards. A field-service component is required as part of the course.

Biology, Molecular Biology, Medical Technology, Restoration Ecology The course names and descriptions of BI 120 (previously Botany) and BI 129 (previously Zoology) have been changed. New titles and descriptions are below.

BI 120 Principles of Biology I

The primary goal of Biology 120 is to provide natural science majors with a sound basis in basic biological concepts that will serve them well in their academic track that lies ahead. Biology 120 will cover the following topics: structure and function of macromolecules, cellular respiration, communication and cycle; photosynthesis; Mendelian genetics, inheritance, and DNA structure and function; and evolution, speciation, phylogenetics, and systematics. To maximize success in this course, successful completion of high school biology and chemistry are recommended. Laboratory 3 hours.

BI 129 Principles of Biology II

Biology 129 is intended for students majoring in a natural science and is the continuation of Biology 120. This course deals mainly with the organismal and supra-organismal levels of biological organization. Evolution will be the unifying theme. BI 129 will cover the following topics: origin of life, prokaryotic and eukaryotic diversity; plant evolution and diversity; fungi, invertebrate and vertebrate diversity and evolution; plant and animal form and function; circulation and gas exchange, homeostasis, reproduction and development, nervous system and special senses; and behavior, population and community ecology, and conservation biology. Laboratory 3 hours. Prerequisite: BI 120, Grade of “C” or better or permission of instructor.

History & Integrated Social Studies

The course numbers for HI 240, 250 and 260 have been changed, raising them to the 300 level. They also have additional prerequisites. Changes are in bold below.

- HI 203 Europe: Ancient and Medieval (3)

- HI 398 Historical Methods and Public History (3)
- HI 498 Seminar: Senior Capstone Experience (3)

HI 340 History of the Middle East (3)

An examination of the Middle East and North Africa with a focus on major historical events, such as Islamic expansion, the rise and decline of the Ottoman Empire, and how other historical phenomena affect the Middle East today. Prerequisites: AH 111, AH 112, and a 200-level history course, or permission of instructor.

HI 350 History of Asia (3)

An examination of modern Asian history with particular emphasis on major developments, including interaction with the West, independence movements, ongoing technological advancement, and the ever increasing impact that this area has had on the world today. Offered in odd alternate years. Prerequisites: AH 111, AH 112, and a 200-level history course, or permission of instructor.

HI 360 Modern Latin America (3)

An examination of modern Latin America with particular emphasis on the social, cultural, and political developments in the region over the last two centuries. Prerequisites: AH 111, AH 112, and a 200-level history course, or permission of instructor.

Psychology

PY 320 has been eliminated as an elective option in Psychology.

PY/SW 345 has been added as an elective option in Psychology.

PY/SW 345 Addictive-Compulsive Behavior (3)

This course will examine a wide variety of addictions such as: drugs, work, food, gambling, and video gaming. It will investigate the addictive processes upon the brain, personality, mood, and motivation. A strong focus will be on addiction's disruption of family interactions, occupational life, and other social complications. Prerequisite: PY110.

Social Work (p.53)

Program Admission Policies and Procedures:

Students must meet the following criteria in order to be accepted for admission to the Defiance College Social Work Program:

1. **Have a cumulative grade point average of 2.25 or above.**
2. **Have a cumulative grade point average of 2.5 or above in Social Work courses completed in the pre-professional sequence or permission of the Social Work Program Director.**
